Possible Additional Services

State Respite Funding (*Google this for your state*): This usually requires needs based assessment and may/may not be included in a Medicaid waiver service. Ask if respite services are included in a waiver when applying for waiver services to cover either possibility. *If it is not, ask how to apply for respite. If your son/daughter is on a waitlist for a Medicaid waiver, ask for respite care services.* Respite can fund individual or program type activity. Respite can creatively address an individual exploring interests and participating in activity and developing relationships within the community if waiting for waiver services. This money may also pay for camps and long weekend getaways where supports are available. (I.e.: WSA camps, leisure/hobby/interest camps...)

Discretionary Funds: Find out about these in your local area. Different systems have funds and place them in certain high need areas for individuals they serve. Every state is different. Systems do tend to keep some funds available, even if they are cutting back. Wraparound funds can be part of these funds.

Wraparound Funds: Home and community connection funds. If your son/daughter is struggling with a physical barrier in a home, or has a strong need for an inclusive community network to help create community relationships, connect and use community resources/activity and support involvement in community opportunities this may help. School aged children are the obvious focus with schools. If schools have wraparound funds available (or can apply on behalf of a student) this could open a door to wrap disability services into the home and community environments by developing a strong positive action plan and use support services to gain specific needs to be met. Also a possible wraparound can exist for an individual who is transitioning into a more inclusive/integrated living and community arrangement until the person is settled and connected.
